School Visits

We offer a tailored educational experience to support learning on Judaism, immigration and the Holocaust, at primary and secondary levels. Pupils can visit the historic synagogue, Scottish Holocaust-era Study Centre, kosher kitchen and our displays about lewish immigration to Scotland and the Holocaust period.

Drawn from original archival material, our Learning Kits allow pupils to find out about the lives of individuals who came to Scotland as refugees from Nazi-occupied Europe.



Schools can apply for up to 75% of transport costs for each class visit as part of the Scottish Government's Heritage Travel Subsidy for Schools Scheme.



Discover Scotland's Jewish history

The Scottish Jewish Heritage Centre is based in Garnethill Synagogue, Glasgow, a beautiful Category A listed building in the city centre.

Opened in 1879, Garnethill Synagogue is a stunning example of high Victorian architecture and was the first purpose-built synagogue in Scotland. It still has an active congregation and is also the home of the Scottish Jewish Archives Centre.

You can visit by booking to join one of our weekly guided tours. We also run a varied programme of events, and welcome school visits.



Tours include access to the magnificent Prayer Hall and the many displays highlighting aspects of Jewish religious practice and way of life. Our tours offer an unrivalled insight into how the Jewish community has contributed to Scotland over the last 200 years.

The permanent displays are:

- Glasgow's Jewish roots and the history of Garnethill Synagogue.
- A New Life in Scotland About Jewish immigrants settling in Scotland, from the late 1700s through to contemporary communities.
- Scotland a Sanctuary On refugees who fled Nazi
 oppression and arrived in Scotland between the 1930s
 and 1950s, and how people from all backgrounds
 helped those in peril.



Tours last around 1.5 hours and run weekly, with some exceptions - please check the website for the most up-to-date information.
